

A River Flows Free: EXHIBIT PREVIEW

For the past year the Center has worked with Alchemy of Design, a skilled exhibit contractor, and other partners, to create A River Flows Free, a unique exhibit on John Day Basin History. The video is visually stunning, using many little-seen historic images. It takes you through eight historic Frontiers in the John Day Basin. Wheeler High School Fossil Beds (By Steve Lundgren)

The unassuming knoll above Wheeler High School's football field holds an opportunity few other places in the West have—the chance for everyday folks to touch 33 million years of history. Buried in the buff and rust colored rocks not far from the 50-yard line are the fossils of a forest that included the metasequoia (Oregon's State Fossil) oaks, alder, maple and other plants that once flourished in a warmer, wetter climate here. That isn't unusual. Fossils abound in north Central Oregon. What is unusual is that for a small fee anyone can dig up a few fossils here. And that's a fact that draws people from all over.

Jim Smith, School Superintendent said he has met visitors from England, France, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands and elsewhere, as well as from all over the United States, who come to dig fossils here. He said many visitors have done their research well before arriving. The site is especially popular with families with children, from ages 5-17.



On a blustery day in late April, as Smith explained this, a family from the Seattle area pulled up, plunked a few bucks in the honor bucket, and happily climbed the hill. The sweet spot for fossil hunters lies close to the top of a low but steep hill. It is the end of a long ridge that arcs down from the hills to the east of Fossil.

This small school district is well aware of the unique gift geography has provided. This K-12 school hosts about 25 pupils and serves as a natural resources charter school, with a focus on the resource economy of the Columbia River Basin. Science class can go beyond a textbook when there's a hill full of hands-on learning in the backyard. Digging Fees provide a small windfall for the district every year, about \$5,000. Fees are collected on the honor system. Smith said the school district plans to improve the access and interpretation of the site. A small onsite display case shows local fossils. The school keeps a small supply of buckets and hand tools for digging.
